Parish Records and Bishops Transcripts

These are not distinguished but the copies of original entries are normally easily found on Ancestry. The main parishes are Bagendon, Baunton, Cirencester, North Cerney, St. Nicholas Gloucester, and Stratton in Gloucestershire and Minety in Wiltshire.

INTRODUCTION

This article describes the properties of Bagendon mostly leased by the Thynne family who were Lords of the Manor from the Civil War until the beginning of the nineteenth century.

Rees in his book on Bagendon (*Rees*) deals sketchily with this period being unable to consult the records at Longleat. With these now available and the vastly increased records in Gloucestershire Archives and elsewhere it is possible to trace the tenants holding the various properties or estates over this time.

The Manor and its Lords

In Domesday the Manor of Bagendon was worth £4 and the mill 10/-. William the Conqueror dispossessed Woolward (or Ulward or Wolfward) and gave the Manor to Hugo l'Asne (Hugh the donkey) who had a tenant, Gilbert. William Rufus replaced Hugo with Chandos whose tenant was Richard de Bagendon. The next owners from the de Bagendon family were the Weavers Company of Cirencester who bought it in 1382 to support their chantry chapel of the Holy Trinity in Cirencester Parish Church. Hence the name Trinity Mill. The *valor ecclesiasticus* recorded the annual tithe as 3s. 4d.

With the suppression of the chantries, the Manor became crown property and was granted in 1648 to Sir Thomas Seymour, brother of the Protector, Edward Seymour, Duke of Somerset. But Sir Thomas was executed in 1549 and Sir John Thynne, former steward of the Seymour family, builder of Longleat and ancestor of the Marquesses of Bath obtained the grant of the Manor.

Sir John Thynne died in 1580 to be succeeded by his son, also Sir John, until 1604 and then by his son, Sir Thomas, until 1639. Thomas's heir was Sir James Thynne, who was succeeded by his grandson Thomas, known as 'Tom of ten thousand'. He was assassinated in 1682 and succeeded by a half cousin also named Thomas who became 1st Viscount Weymouth. Again the line failed in 1714 and his grand nephew, Thomas the 2nd Viscount, inherited. This Thomas died in 1751 and his son, again Thomas, became the first Marquess of Bath in 1789, dying in 1796. His son Thomas, the second Marquess, sold the Manor of Bagendon in 1800 to Joseph Pitt, a Cheltenham financier, who sold off the freeholds of the estates to the tenants (*Burnett*).

The Records

The records of Bagendon Manor at Longleat during the period of the Thynne's ownership are comprehensive and include three surveys: the first in 1684, the next beautifully written in c.1746 and the last in 1771 with rentals in various years from 1771 up to 1791. In addition, there are Steward's accounts, minutes of Courts Baron, rentals, individual leases and odd notes. While the major records have been transcribed there may be additional details in some of the others.

The LA records are complemented by the extensive records at Gloucestershire Archives mainly consisting of leases or their counterparts and licences to assign, but most importantly of the Inclosure Award of 1792.

There are also some records at the National Archives, particularly those relating to the Civil War. All this is supplemented by Wills, Marriage Licences, and Parish Registers.

The Civil War

The Civil War was a difficult time for Sir James. While he did not fight for the King and was criticised for his failure, the Manor of Bagendon and other properties were sequestered because he attended the King's Oxford Parliament which sat from January 1644 until March 1645. He claimed the benefit of the Exeter Articles and was fined the moderate amount of £4034. But the record is confusing.

In the 1684 Survey of Bagendon, John Howe Esq. is recorded as granting a Bagendon lease on 10th November 1644 and another on 25th. March 1647/8. John Howe must have administered the sequestration, being the Sir John Howe 1st Baronet who was High Sheriff of Gloucestershire in 1660. But Sir James Thynne is recorded to have granted free bench by copy of Court Roll on 26th March 1746/7 and to have granted a lease on 26th February 1648/9. This suggests sequestration was in force in 1644 and in 1647/8 but not in 1646/7.

The records of the Committee for Compounding record the sequestration ending on 29th December 1746 with repayment of rents received by the County Commissioners from 24th July 1646. There is also a record of Sir James's complaint on the previous 5th December that the County Commissioners have sold his unfelled underwoods on the Manor of Bagendon

to one of the sequestrators for £45 begging to be allowed to have them at that price (NA: SP23/ 3 f.354; /123 f.238 & /228 f.354).

On 15th June 1648, the House of Commons resolved to accept £3100 for Sir James's offence in deserting Parliament and going to Oxford. He relied on the Articles of Exeter, The House approved an Ordinance, granting a Pardon and taking off the sequestration. This was sent to the Lords for their concurrence who a few days later approved a bundle of these resolutions (*Journal*).

The explanation may lie in the complicated Thynne family feud of the time. While Sir James inherited the entailed estate of Longleat in 1639, much of his father's property and wealth went to his second wife, who was sole executor, and to her son Sir Henry Frederick Thynne, Sir James's' half-brother, Sir Henry was a royalist and also suffered sequestration. Endless legal disputes ensued and on 18th May 1649, Sir James asks for a stay of proceedings until a lawsuit regarding disputed possession of sequestered Gloucestershire property was determined. On 23rd November 1650 a fine was paid and the estate was discharged. But further proceedings followed (NA:SP23/12 f..41: /123 f.209: /123 f.223).

It appears that Sir John Howe as sequestrator leased properties to James Dowle of Chedworth Gent (Beares Hey 1661) In 1653 Sir James took out a mortgage for £1000 from James Dowle of Chedworth gent and Richard Eycott yeoman of all their lands. Presumably this was the freehold. Then in 1661 Sir James purchased for £146-5-0 from Sir John Howe and Giles Dowle (son of James Dowle) and his wife Elizabeth, leasehold properties 'then fully estated' (Bagendon Farm 1653 and 1661).

Courts Baron

There is no record of a visit to Bagendon by a member of the Thynne family. It was managed on the family's behalf by Stewards who were or claimed to be gentlemen. Robert Brereton was Steward signing the 1684 Survey and the 1701 Court Baron. Mr Ord was Steward at the 1719 Court Baron, Mr Bayly at the 1729 one, and Gilbert Mainwaring at the 1736 one. The Steward in 1746 appears to have been Mr Cox (Bear Inn 1746) although John Eycott was Bailiff and kept accounts from 1741-1749. Then Alexander Ready was Steward followed by Mr Archer from 1771 -1791 judging by his Survey and Rental.

Stewards held Courts Baron at irregular intervals and the tenant of Bagendon Farm was required to provide for the Court twice a year. Presumably this involved refreshment as well as a Courtroom. On one occasion the Court was adjourned to Mr. Ashmead's house (which was the Bear Inn) to agree on inclosures of the Common Lands but it seems there were not any inclosures at this time (Bear Inn 1736).

Tenants were required to attend as jurors of the Homage and two affeerers were appointed to exact fines. Most of the business of the courts consisted of noting the deaths of tenants and the next takers. There were also details of exchanges of land between tenants. Complaints were made of changed watercourses (Court Baron 1701) blocking the stream at Trinity Mill (Court Baron 1732) grinding away from the Lord's Mill (Courts Baron 1735 and 1736) and living in a cottage on the Lord's waste (Courts Baron 1735 and 1736)

The manorial estates and other properties

The surveys list the properties of the Manor. There were the two demesne properties, Bagendon Farm and Moore House. After the Dowles, Bagendon Farm and Agg's were held by the members of the wealthy Eycott family and the Moore House was in their possession earlier and for an even longer period. Bagendon Farm and Moore Farm was rebuilt as mansions early in the eighteenth century according to *Rees* (p.67) but this may in fact have been in the 1740's when LA Accounts indicate there was a lot of building.

Next in importance was Trinity Mill or Mills occupied first by the Burge family and then leased to Thomas Fewster followed by the Lanes and the Hapgoods. The Ravenhills were tenants of the New Inn & Bear Inn which descended through marriage to the Ashmeads, Bells and Days. There were then ten farm properties which are named after tenants. The Parsloes, originally rented School Lands, a small freehold tenement of the George family of neighbouring Baunton. They then acquired Parsloes from the Geggs and Hills from the Hills. Both properties LA: NMR 2119, 1684 Survey remained in the family until 1817. They also rented Brown's from the Brown family for many years. The Poultons, Ferrars, Ferrises, Guests and Packers were related and tenanted the Jeff properties and Wrights. The Packers were also related to the Parsloes and inherited their School Lands property. The Huntingdons substituted Aggs for their Glebe lands. Moor Wood was normally retained by the Lord and not included in surveys. Nor were the Glebe lands of the Rector, the Master family's freehold of lot mead or the Yellow School estate.

Each property is the subject of a separate note followed by schedule showing the descent of the tenancy. When the same tenant held more than one property they tended to be amalgamated (e.g., Jeff's and Jeff's Cottage). The Surveys all show 13 or 14 manorial properties; but the 1792 Inclosure Award has 10 plus three not in the surveys. By this time the bulk of the land was held by the Haines family. Following the sale to Joseph Pitt the tenants bought the freeholds and holdings became even more concentrated so that in the nineteenth century two families, the Hintons (related to the Haines), and the Croomes, owned almost all the land between them.

Leases

The earliest holdings are by copy of Court Roll where the tenant held for life according to the custom of the manor and where a widow was entitled to free bench (bancus francus) during unmarried widowhood. The Lord would normally regrant the holding to the heir of the deceased tenant.

In the second half of the seventeenth century Bagendon copyholds were replaced by leases or holdings for a term of years. Unlike freeholds and copyholds, a leasehold was not an 'estate of inheritance' and was treated as a chattel so that it passed to the executor or administrator of a deceased tenant and not to his heir. So an entail of a leasehold was not possible but a mid sixteenth century case (*Rawlinson*) established that a lease could be left by Will to one person for life with remainder to another (*Simpson*). There is one example of conversion of a leasehold to a freehold, probably to facilitate sale of a lease (Trinity Mills 1739).

The term of years in Bagendon leases was a maximum of 99 years but determinable on the lives of up to three people – normally the tenant and his children or sometimes wife and child. There was a small annual or reserved rent, a Fine payable for each life and a heriot due either on the death of each life or of each life in possession. It is not always clear which but the heriot for Jeff's Cottage is interesting. In 1680 it was clearly only payable on the death of the life in possession but the 1701 lease made clear it was payable on the death of any tenant in commom. Later leases seem to require a heriot on the death of any life. The heriot was the tenant's best beast or chattel (i.e., apparently a dead animal) or, later, a fixed sum, at the Lord's option.

While there are examples of sales (or assignments) of leases (e.g., Jeff's 1738 and 1763) normally a Fine was paid to replace each deceased life with a new one recorded in a new lease. In the eighteenth century it became normal to specify the age of a new life to prevent tenants giving the same name to more than one child. This was done so that if the elder child died, he or she could be replaced by the younger one without payment of a Fine.

While the annual rent and the fixed sum for the heriot almost never changed, the amount of Fines increased throughout the eighteenth century.

Spinsters and widows could be tenants or leaseholders and attend the Court Baron as a Companion. But as the property of a married woman belonged to her husband new leases were granted to and taxes paid by the husband. However a widow of a copyholder but not of a leaseholder had the right of free bench during her widowhood unless she remarried.

In a letter preserved at Longleat., the Steward, Alexander Ready, wrote on 13th April 1742:

The usual way of Letting Estates for Lives in Lord Weymouths Manors is For three Lives 14 years purchase. For Two in Revercion to be added to one in possession six years purchase and to ad one in Revercion to two in being Two years purchase of the full amount".

Unsurprisingly, in practice the charges appear to have been higher (Bear Inn 1746).

Leases followed a standard form and were laboriously written out twice by hand on a large sheet of vellum which was divided in two with a wavy cut so that the Lord retained the top part and the tenant the bottom or counterpart. In the middle of the eighteenth century printed leases were introduced where only the particulars of the tenancy needed to be inserted.

Timber and mineral rights was always reserved to the Lord.

Covenants included requirements to attend Stewards Court., to repair premises; to plant yearly 3 fruit trees (apple or pear) and 3 trees likely to make timber (oak, ash or elm); to permit enclosure of Common Fields (Parsloes 1692). One tenant had to keep a dog and another to provide two good capons yearly at Christmas – an echo of an earlier age (Brown's 1713 and Jeff's 1660/1).

Leases could be forfeit not only for non-payment of rent but for voluntary or wilful waste not put right; for letting to any person for more than 5 years other than to the parties named or their children at death: and curiously for being retained in service to any person or persons under the King or Queen without permission (Parsloes 1692).

Land Tax

Land Tax was introduced in 1692 and was a fraction (which later became fixed at a fifth) of the then annual rental value of a property. In 1780 its payment became a qualification for voting and so it became important to have a record of payments. For this reason, the assessments from 1780 to 1832 have survived and normally provide an annual statement of the owner and occupier of each property (*Land Tax Guide* and *Land Tax (England*).)

The Bagendon assessments are complete apart from 1785, 1787, 1792, 1806 and 1828. They are normally signed by three Justices of the Peace, and two assessors and collectors are often named or sign.

The valuation of properties on which the tax was based was never changed and so its importance wane. In 1798 it became possible to redeem the obligation to pay the tax with a 15 year purchase and Edward Haines took advantage of this for his various properties in 1804 as did Daniel Mathews for Brown's in the following year.

THE PROPERTIES

BAGENDON FARM

The present house, known as Bagendon Manor or Manor Farm was built in the mid-eighteenth century although the listing particulars (and *Rees*) wrongly assign it to the early eighteenth. It was built on the site of the earlier Manor House. It and Moor House were the two demesne properties It appears the original mansion house was built by Sir James Thynne.

In 1649 Sir James Thynne granted James Dowle a lease of the 'the farm called Bagendon Farm with the Farm House and lands belonging'. References in other leases (Coates, Burrowes Mead, Brown's) to James assigning or selling bits of part of the property which he acquired from John Howe, the sequestrator, suggest that this lease may have replaced one from John Howe of all or most of the manorial lands.

James Dowle was a gentleman. In 1653 James Dowle of Chedworth, gentleman and Richard Eycott, yeoman, mortgaged their lands in Bagendon for £1000 to Sir James Thynne. These must have been Bagendon Farm in Dowle's case and Moor House in Eycott's. Then in 1661, there was a bond for repayment of £40 between Giles Dowle of Chedworth, gent (James's son) and Edmund Pollard of Duntisbourne Leer, yeoman. Also in 1661 is a record of Sir James purchasing leasehold tenements 'fully estated' (i.e., with three lives in being) from Sir John Howe, and Giles Dowle and his wife Elizabeth. This included Parsloes but it is not clear if it also included Bagendon Farm.

Giles Dowle leased or sub-let various Bagendon properties, possibly from this estate to other tenants, and, as appears from the previous paragraph, was involved with both the Eycotts and with Sir John Howe, who granted Bagendon leases during the sequestration of Thynne's property, including one to Dowle.

The estate was clearly the most important in Bagendon and the lease required provision to be made for the Lord, his Steward and Officers and Servants for keeping Court twice a year.

William Chaundler of Lower Dunsbourne and Emma Foster of Bagendon were married at Bagendon on 13th November 1684. On September 13th 1685, Sir John Thynne leased a cottage to William Chandler on his life and that of his wife Emma and son Thomas Chandler. Leases to 1700 record that the cottage has a garden and was 67 feet in length and 18 feet in breadth. The Value and Fine were both £4, the rent 4/- and the heriot 3/4.

The cottage became part of the Bagendon Farm estate. On 27th August 1745, Lord Weymouth granted John Eycott of Circnester, goldsmith, a lease of a farmhouse and lands etc. among which was 'a cottage with the appurtenances near the Farm house called Chandlers Cottage'. In the 1792 Inclosure award, the Schedule of Edward Haines holdings in Bagendon Farm includes 'Cottage & Garden called Chandler's Cottage of 8 perches'.

From James the estate passed to his son Gyles and his wife Mary and then to Gyles brother, Job senior, and from him to his son, Job junior. For the latter, October 1700 was a calamitous time with him losing his second wife and their two children in a matter of days. Job junior lived on until 1723. The Court Baron of 1729 records his death, and that Mr. John Burgh is the next taker. There are no Burgh's in the Bagendon registers, so this is John Burge. It is likely this was the younger brother of Samuel Burge of Trinity Mills whose death was also presented with his brother the next taker. But it is clear John did not keep the property but sold it to the Eycott family at some point after 1723.

The Eycott family had been long in the Bagendon area and is the subject of extensive research by John Eacott, a descendant (*Eacott*). We find them originally in the other demesne property, The Moore or Moor House, in that part of Woodmancote that is within the parish of Bagendon; they subsequently take a lease of Jeff's.

The Eycotts may have been there a long time judging by earlier records although it is not possible to determine whether references to Eycotts in Woodmancote are to Woodmancote in Bagendon or to Woodmancote in North Cerney, where there was also a large Eycott family.^{iv}

William was baptised at Bagendon on 2nd January1650/1, the son of Richard Eycott who was married to Anne. William had younger brothers, Berkeley and Thomas, and a sister, Ann. William and Berkeley were apprenticed as goldsmiths in

London, perhaps through the influence of their presumed great uncle, Sir Thomas Viner, Lord Mayor of London in 1653, whose first wife was an Eycott.

William was apprenticed in 1668 and Berkeley two years later, on 16th November 1670. After their apprenticeships, William became a goldsmith in Gloucester, and Berkeley in Circnester. On 13th September 1688, Berkeley married Mary Shewell spinster of Circnester. According to the marriage licence, Berkeley was 31 and so born *c*.1657 and Mary was 21.

Although Berkeley was granted leases of Moor House and of Jeff's he was never a leaseholder of Bagendon Farm. It was not until 1745 that Berkeley's eldest son, John, silversmith of Circncester, was granted a lease of Bagendon Farm on the lives of his children, John, Jones, and Elizabeth.

The Eycott lease of 1745 is unusual. It has a Fine of £750 for 3 lives but also requires expenditure of a further £250 on rebuilding. Clearly the old Manor House was replaced at this time and there is other evidence of building work at Bagendon in the 1740's (LA Bills of Disbursements, Eycott accounts, and Estate letters.

John Eycott was of Cirencester, goldsmith in his Will dated 11th May 1737 and of Cirencester, silversmith, in 1745 when the lease was granted. When he died in 1751, he was of Bagendon.

The 1745 lease is the only record found of the Eycotts being tenants of Bagendon Farm. John does not mention it in his Will. But it passed to his unmarried daughter Elizabeth who left it to her brother Richard in her Will. She died in 1757 and Richard in 1771. Although his brother Jones inherited, he sold out to John Haines of Daglingworth and it descended in the Haines family and their related Hintons until late in the nineteenth century.

We will return to Berkeley and his parents in the sections on Moor House and Coates of both of which he had leases when he died in 1716. He was also a tenant of Jeff's in 1701.

2. TRINITY MILLS

The second estate, Trinity Mills, has a long history and been the subject of an article by Joyce Baker, a local historian who once lived there (Baker). This paper provides much additional information on the tenants in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries.

In 1382 the Weavers Company of Cirencester bought the Manor of Bagendon including its mill to support their chantry chapel of the Holy Trinity in Cirencester Parish Church. Hence the name Trinity Mill. In 1534 the *Valor Ecclesiasticus* recorded the annual tithe of the mill as 3/4. The adjacent Rack Orchard and later references to a fulling or clothing mill indicate that this was a cloth and possibly also a corn mill as do the references to Trinity Mills in the plural in the 1793 Will of William Burge and the 1700 lease.

The first known miller was John Deynton who baptised a daughter Rebecca at Bagendon on 30/10/1580. Then in 1608, William Stratford is the miller at Bagendon, middle aged and of lower height (*Smith*).

The first known tenant of the Burge family was John Burge. He was granted a lease on 19th August 1668 on the lives of his son William and William's sons John and Samuel. He is described as a carrier of Circncester in the lease but as a Woollman (i.e. clothier) in his Will dated 20th September 1691.

While the son William is the executor of the Will, John left 2/6 each to unnamed sisters and brothers and 10/- to three grandchildren of his second son Samuel who married Rebecca Poulton the Rector's sister.

John's son William died two years later, and it is clear from his Will dated 3rd February 1693 that he was a wealthy man. Having property in more than one diocese, his Will was proved in London. He left legacies of money totalling £2075, including £100 for his grandson Samuel for the purchase of a life in the lease of the Lands and Mills called Trinity Mills. The reference to Mills rather than Mill again suggests that there was both a corn or grist mill and a cloth mill at the time.

William's provisions regarding the Mills are complicated. His son John receives the Mills for life, but his son Samuel receives the Lands accompanying them also for life. John is to pay £20 p.a and Samuel £10 p.a. to his three daughters while they are unmarried (and with the unmarried taking up the share of any of them who marry). When all are married John gets both Mills and the Lands for life with remainder to his brother Samuel for life with remainder to William's grandson Samuel absolutely.

William does not say whether the grandson Samuel was a son of John or Samuel but John had no known son of that name whereas his brother Samuel did and is presumably meant.

John did not enjoy the Mills for long being buried at Bagendon on 4th December 1697. In his Will he left Trinity Mills to his son John but with remainder if both his son John and his daughter Ann died under age to his brother Samuel's son John. His son died in the same month as he did and the gift over to Ann was probably not effective as his brother Samuel then inherited. In the next lease on 12th October 1700 Samuel added his son John as a life to himself and his son Samuel. John's baptism has not been found.

This may because the family or some members of it were Quakers. In his Will John left £2 to his married sister Mary Kemble 'towards the building of a Meeting house'. Furthermore, his grandmother Elizabeth Burge is likely to be the Elizabeth Burge of Gloucester wife of John Burge buried at Cirencester on 3rd February 1682 who belonged to the Nailsworth Monthly Meeting.

Samuel appears as juror and affeerer in the Bagendon Court Baron of 3rd May 1701. Oddly and unlike other tenants he receives no stint for sheep. Samuel died in 1728 and was buried in Cirencester on 14th March. His son Samuel then leased Trinity Mill and the associated lands to Thomas Fewster on 10th May for £40 p.a. but Samuel then died in 1729 and was buried in Cirencester on 22nd February. Letters of administration were granted on 2nd April 1729 to his brother John of Cirencester, woolcomber, and his sister Ann, wife of Joseph Maysey also of Cirencester, woolcomber.

Thomas Fewster converted the Mill from a fulling mill to a grist mill. This requires a stronger flow of water which probably accounts for him being fined for diverting the watercourse, Thomas could not pay the rent and suffered distraint, the sale of his goods, and imprisonment. He sued John Burge and the Mayseys but lost possession of the Mill in 1733. A new tenant, Richard Blandford was then installed at a lower rent of £30 p.a. i

Presumably to raise money for the rent, Thomas Fewster put an advertisement in the March 1732 issue of the Gloucester Journal to let the Mill. It required applications to be made to Thomas Fewster at Gloucester Castle (where he was in prison) or to Sarah Fewster at the Mill. In the same year the Court Baron at Bagendon fined Thomas Fewster 20/- for not letting the water pass in its usual channel.. Then in 1735 the Court Baron fined 3 tenants 5/-, amerced to 2/6 but with a fine of 20/- for any repetition, for not grinding at the Lord's Mill (i.e. Trinity Mill). They were doubtless grinding their corn at North Cerney mill which had been let to John Parsloe, son of Edith, one of the tenants.

In 1739 John Burge took out a new lease without a fine; this was only to convert his existing chattel lease into a freehold to John 'and his heirs for his life only' as the Survey somewhat quaintly puts it. The purpose appears to have been to sell a life with a right of renewal as advertised in 1742.

On 13th September 1742, the Cirencester Flying Post advertised the sale of a life in the tenancy of the mill with the purchaser having the right of renewing the lease; enquiries were to be made to Thomas Bush Esq. or to John Burge of Cirencester.

It seems likely the purchaser of the life in 1742 was Edmund Lane and he certainly became the tenant at some point. He was an 'edge-tool maker. Circnester was famous for edge tool making, particularly for fine currier's knives at the time. Deeds of 1809 and 1819 refer to Trinity Mills having an edge tool mill as well as a grist mill, but only a grist mill in 1841.

In his Will, dated 21st November 1769, with a codicil dated 27th August 1770, and probate on 22nd September 1772, Edmund leaves his lease of a messuage and water grist mills and grinding mill in Bagendon to his wife Sarah for life with remainder to his son Robert, his heirs, administrators and assigns. It appears the lives on the lease with Edmund were John Burge and Edmund's wife, Sarah.

Robert died before his mother and was buried in Circnester on 13/7/1781. He 'fell from his Horse near Swindon (as supposed) in an apopleche fit (*sic*) and expired without speaking a word'.

Robert's mother Sarah died in 1785. As Sarah Lane widow, she was buried at Cirencester on 11/2/1785. Her Will dated 3/8/1779 was proved on 17/6/1785. Robert's widow, also Sarah, became the next taker of the Mills.

In 1785 and again in 1788, Lord Weymouth renewed the lease. In 1788, Edmund Lane, Sarah's son by Robert aged about 14, replaced Ann Young who was a life in the 1885 lease. So Sarah was the leaseholder in the 1792 enclosure award and purchased the freehold from Joseph Pitt for £450, after the sale of the Manor to Pitt by the Marquess of Bath. She was buried at Cirencester on 30th March 1823 aged 77.

A March 1797 partnership agreement between Sarah Lane and her son Edmund Lane, edge tool makers. Survives (GA: D182-V-27). It makes no mention of Trinity Mill but makes Sarah and Edmund equal partners in their Cirencester business and provides for either of Edmund's younger brothers, Robert or William to become partners if Sarah dies or retires. Edmund was baptised in Cirencester on 29th May 1774 and was buried there on 2nd November 1824 and had a son also Edmund.

Robert and Sarah's son, Robert, was buried at Bagendon of Trinity Mill on 11th September 1839 and left the Mill in his Will (dated 21st August and proved 18th November 1839) to his nephew Edmund, son of his deceased brother Edmund. He may therefore have become a partner on Sarah's death in 1823 or before.

The later history of the Mill and its owners is outside the scope of this account but is dealt with in Joyce Barker's paper.

the names of the occupiers. The first known lease in 1648 was to Nicholas was granted by Sir John Howe presumably because Bagendon was sequestered at this time.

In 1686 Lord Weymouth granted a new lease to Thomas Hill and Mary Broad who were married two years later. The lease was on their lives to take effect on the death of Nicholas which occurred in 1689. As Elizabeth Marchant was still then a life in being in 1686, the lease appears to have resulted from a sale by Nicholas to Thomas. No other connection between the Marchants and the Hills is known.

In 1710, Thomas Hill was granted an additional lease of Birts Ham (or Barretts Mead) on his life and that of his daughters Elizabeth and Mary. His wife died in 1714 and he remarried in the same year. Two sons, Thomas and Job followed. Job died young and Thomas senior himself died in 1742. His son, Thomas is found in 1746 owing money to both Lord Weymouth and his steward John Eycott. This was probably in respect of Birt's Mead as, in 1742, following the death of Thomas senior, John Parsloe was granted a lease of Hills. From this time until the sale in 1817, both Hill's and Parsloe's were in the Parsloe family

The original lives of the 1742 lease were John Parsloe, his wife's aunt Joyce Alexander, and a friend's son Nathaniel Haynes. On Joyce Alexander's death in 1749, John Handy, son of another friend, was made a life, but only until 1760 when John Parsloe's daughter Mary, later Mary Randall, replaced him.

In his first 1774 Will, John left Hill's to his grand-daughter Mary Randall but in his 1778 Will which was proved in 1785 he gave her £200 instead and left Hill's to his son Thomas. He gave Thomas gave a life interest in

Thomas therefore inherited Hill's on his father's death with Mary Randall the only surviving life. In a new 1786 lease Thomas added his own life and that of Mary Randall's son William.

In the 1792 inclosure award, Hill's tenement received 8 acres in the Northfield and 75 acres in the Southfield, and the property now includes a Cottage, Garden and Orchard not found in former leases and described as near Barrett's Brook. New leases reflecting these changes were entered into in 1794.

Hill's lies north of the stream to the left of the road leading up the hill from Perrott's Bridge. The cottage, garden and orchard near Perrett's Brook is isolated from the rest of the property and on the east of the parish. This property does not appear in the parcels for the 1760 lease but is on the schedule of the existing holdings in the enclosure award. It is not clear how it became part of Hill's.

In 1800 the Marquis of Bath sold the manor of Bagendon to Mr. Pitt, the financier, and in 1802 Thomas acquired the freehold of both Hill's and Parsloe's for £901 plus timber valued at £85-4s-1d. There are many lengthy deeds and Thomas in fact agreed to the purchase at the same time as Mr. Pitt's purchase of the Manor, but the death of a trustee delayed completion.

The sad tale of the loss by Thomas Parsloe of almost all his property, including Hill's, is outside the scope of this article but is fully described elsewhere (*Parsloe family*). It was probably caused by the fall in the prices of agricultural products after the end of the Napoleonic wars. Suffice it to say that a series of deeds from 1812 evidenced Thomas's ever increasing debts. At last he agreed to a Trust for Sale and his Bagendon estates were auctioned at the King's Head Inn in Cirencester on 30th June 1817. Hills was sold by auction to Edward Haines while Parsloe's was bought by the then Rector of Bagendon, John Lewis Bythesea

4 BEARES HEY also COATES

This small property of 25 acres is confusing. While the ownership is mostly clear, it appears that it may have been sublet at times. In his1724 Will, John Parsloe left his wife Elizabeth "all the logs and shroud of all trees and old trees growing or to be growing on my little close in Badgington. |He then left his son Giles his lease of Coates Close with a right of renewal provided Giles paid his brother Charles £2 p.a. It is not clear whether this is the same as the estate called Bearshey also Coates described below.

Willm Hytchman married Katherine Cotes at Bagendon on 23rd August 1625. Mary and Katherine, daughters of Wm Coates [or Coate] were baptised at Bagendon on 9th March 1650/1 and daughter Katherine was buried on the following 12th March. But William Hitchman was then dead, buried at Bagendon on 25th December 1650. ¹

It seems clear that the widow Katherine had a brother or nephew William Coates. For in 1644 John Howe Esq. granted William Coates and Mary Tomes a lease on their lives of a tenement or cottage and land called Beares Hey to commence after the widow Katherine's death. Mary was probably the Mary daughter of John and Mary Toms baptised at Cirencester on 13th October 1616.

In 1661 Gyles Dowle (who had apparently acquired the reversion from John Howe) granted a new lease to William Coates, adding the life of his son also William aged about 8. The 1684 Survey records that the widow Katherine and William's wife, Mary, are dead but that both Williams are alive.

Katherine Hitchman was buried in Cirencester on 2nd December 1679. When Mary died is uncertain but she may be the Mary Coates spouse of William buried at Westbury-on-Trym on 4th September 1661. William Coates husbandman was buried at Bagendon on 22nd November 1692. Whether this was the father or the son is uncertain but inheritance of the tenancy had already passed to the Eycotts, probably by purchase as, so far as is known, they were not related.

On 1st November 1692, just before William Coates death, Berkeley Eycott took a lease of the property on his life and that of his son John, commencing on William death. This lease gives a full description of the land attached to the tenement.

In 1717 Berkeley Eycott died and left Bears Hey (which he calls Coates living) to his wife for 7 years (or until her remarriage if earlier) with remainder to his son Thomas.

The Court Baron of 1719 notes the death of Mr. Berkley Eycott and that Thomas Eycott his son in the next taker. The 1728/9 rental records the Widow Eycott paying a rent of £2-6-0. It is clear this was £2-4-0 for Moor House and 2/- for Coates Close. Thomas will have inherited both estates in that year but died in 1730. In 1737, Thomas's elder brother John, who was the surviving life, was granted a new lease on 21/2/1736/7 adding the lives of his sons, John and Jones, to his own. This lease was for the lands only as the 1746 Survey notes that the house is said to be totally down and the Archer Survey in 1771 refers to it as a tenement and not a messuage or tenement.

John Eycott senior died in 1751 and left both Coates and Moor Farm to his sons Richard and Thomas; but it appears that in fact his son John became tenant. The Archer Survey states that John's sons John and Jones are still living in 1771but a later note says 'lately dead sell in 2 years'. The original survey also states that the property is let with Moore Farm and the rent paid by the owner & now Mrs Bishop. Mrs Bishop must be Ann Bishop formerly Huntingdon, wife of John Bishop of Cirencester woolcomber, who was the surviving life in the Agg estate. ii

The property continued to be linked to Moor Farm and while John Eycott is shown paying the rent from 1771-7, from 1781 to 1786, John Bishop, Ann husband, is shown (obviously in right of his wife) as proprietor on Land Tax records while Nathaniel and then Edward Haines are the occupiers. Both properties are treated as one in the 1792 Inclosure Award when the leaseholder was John Small Esq. of Cirencester, the son of Joseph Small, who became leaseholder in 1779 after the death of Richard Eycott. As John Bishop is still shown as proprietor from 1791-3, presumably he had a sublease from Small. Small was dead by the end of 1793 and Ann Bishop died in 1795. By 1797, at latest, the property was acquired by Edward Haines who was named as both proprietor and occupier from 1797 to 1803 when he redeemed the Land Tax. iii

¹ The Bailiff's list of leases to 1700 (NA:C108/208) gives Richard not William Coates as the tenant of both the 1644 and the 1661 lease (which it dates as 1660). Presumably Richard is an error for William. William's father may be the Richard Coates buried at Bagendon on 31/8/1624.

ⁱⁱ The Archer Survey also has an additional note against the property: 'supposed to be peachy's' and below 'lately dead and sell in two years 20 Commons Mrs Parsloe, about an acre of Meadow in 'Barris Mead rent by Mr Har[d]ing'. But it is clear that Peachy's is Burrowes Mead.

5 &11. NEW INN & BEAR INN

In 1669 Sir James Thynne granted Thomas Ravenhill by copy of Court Roll 3½ acres on the Upper Moore on which a mansion house had been lately built, together with other land. This was the Old Bear Inn.

In 1676, Joseph Pitman, innholder of Cirencester was granted a lease by Thomas Thynne of various lands, including 6 acres near Barretts Bridge on which a dwelling house had been lately built, on the lives of his nephews, John, Daniel and Judith Ravenhill, three of the children of Thomas Ravenhill of Bagendon, innholder and his wife Margaret, Joseph Pitman's sister. This became the New Inn but later took the name Bear Inn while the old one was known as the old inn house.

Thomas died in 1690 and in the following year Lord Weymouth granted his widow, Margaret, a lease of Thomas's copyhold of the Old Bear Inn on the lives of Elizabeth and Thomas Ravenhill, two other children of Thomas and Margaret. Then, in 1699, Weymouth renewed the Pitman lease of the New Inn, to commence on the death of Daniel, on the lives of Margaret's daughter Mary and Giles Lawrence of Yanworth yeoman who had married the elder daughter Elizabeth in 1692.

From this point the two estates descended together. Margaret died in 1712 and it seems that another daughter, Ann, acquired both properties as they then descended through her husband Thomas Eycott and their son also Thomas. Ann died in 1722 and Thomas senior in 1730 describing himself in his Will as an Innkeeper of Bagendon. His son Thomas married Frances Milton, daughter of a Cheltenham innkeeper, but died young in 1732.

Thomas Eycott's widow Frances promptly remarried a widower, John Ashmead, who took over the Bear but himself died in 1741. Frances then ran the Bear and obtained a new lease from Lord Weymouth. It was probably when her daughter, Margaret, by John Ashmead, married Thomas Bell in 1760 that Frances left them to run the Bear and herself went to live at the Moor House with Richard Eycott, from the same family as her first husband; known as Mrs Ashmead she produced a bastard child, Richard, in 1767, dying in 1776 at Moor House (*Rees* p. 59)

Meanwhile the Bells ran the Bear. Thomas Bell died in 1778 but Margaret then remarried William Jones and continued at the Bear until her death in 1787. The next tenant was her daughter Fanny doubtless named after her redoubtable grandmother. This Fanny was the leaseholder of the Inclosure Award. She married Charles Day. He was granted a new lease in 1794 which makes clear that the New Inn that became the Bear had been converted into four small dwelling houses and that the old inn house had become the Bear again. After 1800, Day acquired the freehold from Joseph Pitt for £280 but Fanny died in 1805. Charles continued at the Bear until 1811 when he remarried and moved away. The proprietor for most years thereafter was Henry Howell.

The inns are the subject of an article by the author *The Bear Inn at Perrotts Brook, Bagendon*ⁱ which describes their history more fully.

6. AGG'S

In 1666, Richard Eycott leased, and in 1676, renewed a lease of a house and substantial lands that had been in the possession of a widow called Katherine Agg, on the lives of his widowed daughter-in-law Jane, and her deceased husband Thomas's children, Thomas and Ann. Excepted from Agg land in the lease were six acres of land on which an Inn had been lately built which, with Richard Eycott's consent, had been leased earlier to John Pitman. The descent of this property in traced in Section 5 & 11 New Inn & Bear Inn.

Richard Agg baptised a son and three daughters at Bagendon between 1613 and 1633. In 1617 he is named as a yeoman. A Richard Agg married Katerin Cavete at Coln St. Denis, Gloucester on 13th June 1611.

Richard Eycott died in 1679. His widowed daughter-in-law Jane died in 1716 and her son Thomas was the next taker and is so named in the 1719 Court Baron. He died in 1730. His son Thomas was residuary legatee and executor of his Will but himself died in 1732. Both are described as innholders. Thomas senior in his Will is of Bagendon and Thomas junior in the letters of administration is of Barretts Bridge. Thomas senior married Ann Ravenhill who had inherited the six acres of land and the Inn on it so that he reunited Agg's with the New Inn and the Bear as appears from the 1727/8 rental showing him paying the rent of all three properties.

After his death, Thomas junior's widow Francis took out letters of administration. Although she retained both Inns, it seems she relinquished Agg's estate. For in 1739 the estate was leased to Ann Huntingdon or Huntington, Widow of the late Thomas Huntington, clerk or Rector of Bagendon, on her life and that of her daughters Ann and Elizabeth. The fine for the three lives was £255.

Thomas Huntington had died in the previous year on 2nd January 1738. His wife Ann put up a monument to him in the chancel of the church in Bagendon. Their daughter Ann married John Bishop on 28th December 1758 and the daughter Elizabeth married Robert Hancocks of Cirencester on 19th December 1759. The widow Ann died in 1763 and Elizabeth Hancock or Hancocks died in 1767.

Within a week of Ann's burial, Thomas Townsend obtained a lease in reversion and his son Robert Baker Townsend became a life. The Townsend connection is otherwise unknown. From 1772 to 1777, 'Ann Huntingdon, now Bishop, is paying the rent apparently with 'Turner' in occupation. Then the Land Tax records show her husband John Bishop as proprietor until Ann's death in 1795, normally with a member of the Haines family in occupation. So in the 1792 Inclosure Award, it is Ann who is named as the leaseholder.

Edward Haines obtained a lease in reversion in 1776 but had to content himself with being occupier until after Ann's death. He was then granted a new lease. He presumably purchased the freehold in 1802 and was shown as both proprietor and occupier in the Land Tax records up to 1803 when he will have redeemed.

7. BURROWS MEADE also BIRT'S MEADE or PEACHY'S

This was an estate with no house on it, being a ham or half acre of ground called Burrowes Mead, or Birts Ham adjoining Barretts Mead, with common in Barretts Mead for 20 sheep. It seems Burrowes Mead and Barretts Mead are the same ground one referring to the barrow and the other land by the bridge. The value of the holding probably lay in the right to pasture 20 sheep.

The first lease in 1653 was to the Birt family, from whom it passed to the Hills in 1710 following the death of Henry Birt junior in 1708. The last lease was in 1710 but the property seems to have gone to Thomas Hill's daughters Mary and Elizabeth and their respective husbands Thomas Harding and Joseph Peachy. Josephus Peachy married Elizabeth Hill at Baunton by banns on 1st April 1714.

Writing to the Steward, Evan Thomas, in 1776, John Parsloe said he could not at the time 'give so exact a description of the late widow Peachy's living as you would wish'. The Archer Survey lists the 1710 lease and the 1772-7 rental gives Haines as paying the rent of 1/-. There is also a note of John Parsloe paying £1-1-9 in 1776/7 for '20 Sheep Commons (Peachy's)' and Nathaniel Haines paying 19/- in 1775/6 and 1776/7 for Barrows Meadow. It looks as if by this time Parsloe was paying for the 20 sheep common and Haines for the land.

From 1780 until 1791, the Parsloes are shown as occupiers paying the land tax of 2/9 with Mrs Peachey as proprietor in 1780 and Lord Weymouth thereafter. In the 1789-91 rental there is no rent listed but in all three years Thomas Parsloe pays 12/- for sheep commons and Nathaniel Haines pays 19/- for 4 acres in Barrets mead.

The position is further confused by the Inclosure Award in 1792 which includes a cottage, garden and orchard of 1 rood and 23 perches in the Schedule of Hill's tenement which is not in earlier leases and also shows the Marquess retaining an allotment for Berts Ham and Commons in hand. From1793 to 1797 the Marquess is shown as proprietor in the Land Tax returns with Edward Haines as occupier but from 1798 until 1800 when Charles Day, the landlord of the Bear is occupier. He is also proprietor from 1801 until 1804 after which the tax was amalgamated with that of the Bear.

The most likely explanation seems to be that at some point, perhaps unnoticed, a cottage was built on the land and the occupation of the cottage, the right to sheep pasture and the award of allotments in the Inclosure Award became split and in different hands at different times.

8. MOORE HOUSE

Moore House and Farm was the second largest estate at Bagendon after Bagendon Farm and, like it, was part of the lord's desmene (Rees p.67).

The estate in 1644 comprised 153.5 acres. The 1761 lease in the Archer Survey records it as having about 152 acres. But the Survey also records a lease of 25 acres in 1737 and that this property is let with Moor Farm and the rent paid by the owner & now Mrs Bishop. So in the Inclosure Award the total acreage is 196 acres 3 roods and 16 perches and is described as Moore Farm and Cotes Tenement. See 4 BEARES HEY also COATES above for the details of this property.

The Court Roll of Bagendon records the grant of a lease of Moore House to Richard Eycott in 1644. Richard died in 1679 and the 1684 survey records his widow Ann claiming free bench. In 1680 Berkeley was granted a lease on his life and that of his sister Ann, to commence on the death of his mother. Then in 1688 Berkeley was granted a new lease substituting his future wife, Mary Shewell, for his sister Ann who probably married in the following year.i

Berkeley's mother Ann died in 1698. So in 1700 Berkeley added his son John as a third life in the Moore after himself and Mary. But the Court Baron for 1701 records a stint of 90 sheep for the widow Jane Eycott, the widow of Berkeley's younger brother Thomas. This was the second largest allocation for any estate and it therefore appears she was living at the Moore at the time.

When Berkeley died in 1716/7, he left money for his youngest son Berkeley to have a life purchased for him but provided that his eldest son John could substitute a male heir if he had one. John duly had a son John later in 1717 and must have purchased the life for him instead of Berkeley.

In 1736, John senior took out a new lease on his own life and that of his sons John and Richard. This does not mention any jointure of his mother Mary but when John senior wrote his Will in 1737, he left his mother £60 per annum secured on Coates and the Moor in full satisfaction of her jointure of the Moor. John gave the estates after the death of his mother to his then under-aged youngest sons Richard and Thomas jointly. So although he was a life, John junior was not left the Moor, Mary Eycott widow was buried in Cirencester in 1740 and John senior in Bagendon in 1751.

The ownership of both the Moor and Coates's after the death of John senior is uncertain as there are difficulties interpreting the Archer Survey and its rentals and the Land tax records. The lives on the Moor lease were John junior and Richard although Richard and Thomas were named in John senior's Will. In 1757 Elizabeth, John's daughter, leaves her 'estate which I hold by lease with all houses etc.' in Bagendon to her brother Richard in her Will. In turn using the same words, Richard in 1771, in his Will leaves the estate to his brother Jones, again using the same description. It is unclear whether this is the Moor or Coates or both or some other property.

It was Jones Eycott who in 1761 was granted a lease of the Moor on the lives of John and Richard and Francis Cotton Small. The preceding entry in the Archer Survey is of Coates's tenement where it was noted that it was let with the Moor Farm and the rent paid by the owner and now Mrs Bishop. Richard was in residence in the Moor when Mrs Ashmead was living with him and their bastard child Richard was baptised in 1767. Richard (the father) died in 1772 and it was presumably then by agreement with Jones Eycott who inherited that Mrs Bishop started paying the Coates's rent. She was the daughter of William Huntingdon, rector of Bagendon and married to John Bishop, cordwainer of Cirencester. John is named as proprietor of Coates's from 1780-1789.

The Eycott connection with the Moor seems to have ended in 1772 and neither Jones nor John refer to it in their Wills (although John Eycott remained a life in the Moor lease until his death in 1789 and is shown paying Coates's' rent in the Archer Survey from 1772-1777).iii

The next tenant of the Moor after Jones Eycott was Joseph Small senior of Cirencester, the father of Francis Cotton Small who was a life in the 1761 lease. Joseph Small had a large family including sons John and Joseph Atwell Small baptised at Cirencester on 27th August 1746 and 2nd February 1747 respectively, and his daughter Francis Cotton Small baptised there on 21st November 1753. Joseph Small senior was granted a lease of the Moor on 8th June 1772, some time before Richard Eycott's death, and substituted the life of his daughter Jane for Richard's.ⁱ

In his 1783 Will Joseph Small left the estate 'called the Moss farm' to his son Joseph Attwood Small conditionally on his paying annuities of £40 each to his sisters Francis Cotton Small and Jane Small. Joseph senior died in 1985 but his Will was only proved in 1816. The proprietor of the Moor in Land Tax returns from 1789-1793 is Joseph Small and the rent is paid by Joseph Small from 1789-91. But John Small is the proprietor in 1788, the tenant in the Inclosure Award, and the owner in Deeds of 1791 and 1793ⁱⁱ.

In 1791 Articles of Agreement were made by John and the two sisters Francis Cotton and Jane for the sale of Moor House to Thomas Parsloe for £2000. For some reason the sale did not proceed. Later the lease of the Moor, which names the sisters as the lives, was conveyed by John to Trustees with other properties to settle debts. It then passed through a number of proprietors and occupiers including Joseph Pitt who, in 1809, sold the freehold to John Haines, Nathaniel's son, who enlarged the house.

Finally, this John died in Withington 1789 and in his Will described his estate as in Badgworth which could be an error for Bagendon. Mary Deighton, widow, 'whose chief business is to attend my Person and shall be in my Service at the Time of my Death' is his executor and is given the estate for life with remainder to his cousin John Webb and his heirs, failing which to his cousin James Ballinger, uncle of John Webb. John Webb was a son of Mary and Daniel Webb of Cirencester, woolcomber, and John Webb's grandmother Sarah was John's sister.

This conflicts with Jones inheriting and possibly a date is misstated.

9. PARSLOE'S

The first known tenant of this property was James Biddle yeoman of Bagendon; the estate is referred to as 'late Bedles' in a 1675 Rental and Survey.

In 1655, for a rental of £1-13-4, Sir James Thynne demised 2 acres of inclosed meadow or pasture ground called Whorshey to Gyles Dowle along with other lands then lately held by copy of Court Roll by James Biddle. The other lands included the remainder of Parsloe's.

In the following year Dowle assigned Whorshey to George Brown (named in 1684 the 'late father' of John Brown) reserving a rent of 1/-. Between 1656 and 1661, Dowle then assigned the remainder of Parsloe's to Thomas Gegg reserving the whole rent of £1-13-4 and a heriot. In 1661 Sir James Thynne Kt. purchased the leasehold of Parsloes and other properties from Sir John Howe, and James Dowle and his wife Elizabeth. Presumably Dowle's lease to Gegg expired or was cancelled as, in 1665, Sir James granted a lease of Parsloe's without Whorshey to Thomas Gegg on his life and that of his wife Rebecca and his son also Thomas. The fine was £45. Gegg was in occupation in 1675 but in 1688 must have sold the lease to John Parsloe yeoman of Bagendon; no other connection between the families is known.

In 1688 John Parsloe surrendered the old lease and, for a fine of £40 for three lives, a new lease was granted to John Parsloe and Elizabeth Blackwell daughter of Giles Blackwell of Chedworth baker. This lease was clearly in contemplation of their marriage later that year. In addition to John and Elizabeth, William Chaunler, son of William Chaunler of Lower Duntisbourne yeoman was a third life and could be replaced free for two years and for £20 after 4 years. In the event their son Giles Parsloe was born in the following year and replaced Chaunler in the 1692 lease.

On John and Giles death in 1728, Giles widow Edith inherited. In 1736 came a new lease with Edith and her son John replacing John and Giles as lives for a fine of £270. It included an additional 4 acres of arable in the South Field, presumably from the inclosures agreed after the 1735 Court Baron, and Coate's Close which had been left to Elizabeth by her husband, John, for her widowhood. In 1749, some years after the death in 1742 of her mother-in-law, Elizabeth Parsloe, Edith was granted a new lease of Parsloe's on her life, that of her son John and a third life to be nominated for a fine of £50. John's first son Alexander was chosen. The lease still included Whoreshay but John agreed to assign it to William Brown.

Following his mother, Edith's death in 1758, John in 1760 took out a new lease with his daughter Ann replacing Edith as a life. Ann died in 1771 and John's first Will in 1774 left Parsloe's and other property to his daughter Margaret but it was not until 1776 that John replaced Ann as a life with his younger son Thomas. He had to pay £60 for his life rather than the previous £50 as appears from part of John's letter to Ewan Thomas, Bath's Steward:

Sir

I was in hopes you would have fixed a rather lower price for my son Thomas's life in my Estate. As you say you will not abate any thing of Sixty Pounds, will agree to give it, so if you will please to order a new Lease to be made, & let me know the time it will be ready, I will take care to have the money by me.

Margaret married Daniel Spackman, a Malmesbury cooper in 1778 and later in the year John made another Will leaving Parsloe's and Hill's to Thomas and leaving Margaret various lands in Rodbourne in recompense. John followed this up in 1781 by giving Thomas a life interest in Parsloe's and other estates.

John died in October 1783 but probate of the second Will was not obtained until 1785. In 1786 Thomas was granted a new lease with his brother, Alexander's seven year old son, John, replacing his father as a life for a further £60.

Parsloe's farm was just a little way beyond the Church on the other side of the road south of Perrotts Brook .In the 1792 inclosure award, Parsloe's tenement received almost 6 acres in the North field and just over 63 in the South Field. There were also a number of exchanges of land.

ii William and Elizabeth Chandler had a son Thomas born on 22nd May and baptised at Duntisbourne Rouse on 27th May 1673, and a son William baptised there on 2nd July 1676. Elizabeth Chandler was buried at Cirencester on 23rd October 1678. So William junior was aged about 12 when made a life in John Parsloe's lease. See BAGENDON FARM HOUSE above for the Chandler's cottage on the farm land.

In 1800 the Marquess of Bath sold the manor of Bagendon to Mr. Pitt, the financier, and in 1802 Thomas acquired the freehold of both Parsloe's and Hill's for £901 plus timber valued at £85-4s-1d. There are many lengthy deeds and Thomas in fact agreed to the purchase at the same time as Mr. Pitt's purchase of the Manor, but the death of a trustee delayed completion. It was also at this time that Thomas agreed to buy Moor House but the sale was not completed.

The sad tale of the loss by Thomas Parsloe of almost all his property, including Parsloe's, is outside the scope of this article. It was probably caused by the fall in the prices of agricultural products after the end of the Napoleonic wars. Suffice it to say that a series of deeds from 1812 evidenced Thomas's ever increasing debts. At last, he agreed to a Trust for Sale and his Bagendon estates were auctioned at the King's Head Inn in Cirencester on 30th June 1817. Parsloe's was bought by the then Rector of Bagendon, John Lewis Bythesea, for £2,950 plus timber subsequently valued at £402. A dispute followed about the lands to be conveyed which was settled by reducing the consideration by £50 so that the total paid was £3,302. It appears from the Land Tax records that Hills was sold to Edward Haines.

In November 1848 Parsloe's was sold following Bythesea's deathⁱⁱ to William Croome of North Cerney. He was succeeded in title by his brother James Capel Croome. Captain Henderson acquired the estate from the Croomes in 1954.

10. WRIGHTS also HARBERTS also POULTON'S also FERRARS also GUEST'S

This was a fairly small property consisting of a house, 5 acres of pasture and 32 acres of arable. In 1646/7 it was held by copy of Court Roll by Thomas Harbert who died in 1656. In the 1684 survey it was held by his widow Katherine in free bench. Then in 1694 there was a new lease in favour of Mary Poulton the wife of the Rector of Bagendon, Thomas Poulton.

Records of Thomas Poulton are incomplete but there is a monument in Bagendon church recording his death on 30th August 1713 at the age of 81 and previously of his wife Mary on 8th March 1709 aged 80. He seems to have been baptised on 30th July 1632 at Pontesbury in Shropshire, son of 'Jacobi'. He was ordained on 1st June 1667 which seems late and described as deacon. Appointed a preacher at Baunton on 23rd July 1673, he was instituted as Rector of Bagendon (of which Thomas Thynne was patron) on 12th June 1679 and was also curate of Baunton from 6th May 1684 to 1687. Rees credits him with an M.A.

Thomas Poulton's wife Mary was baptised in 1631 at Ashton Keynes, daughter of Richard Ferris clerk and Ann. Mary's sister, Emm who died in Bagendon in 1693 'an ancient mayde' left Mary almost all her property. When she made her Will in 1683 she was of Boutheropp (i.e. Southrop near Fairford).

In 1706/7 Thomas Poulton made a Will and left Mary 'all the Corn or grain yt shall be growing upon ye leasehold estate lying in Bagendon which was purchased of my Lord Weymouth.'

In his Will, Thomas Poulton divided his property between his wife and his sister Rebecca who married Samuel Burge in 1683 at Bagendon. But following his wife's death in 1710, Thomas was granted a new lease of Wrights on his life and the lives of Richard Ferris and Richard's daughter Emm Ferris. Richard was a nephew of Mary Poulton, Thomas's deceased wife. Richard's wife Ann also had a mother who was a Poulton. After the death of Thomas Poulton in 1714. Richard Ferris became the leaseholder.

Richard also became the leaseholder of JEFF'S COTTAGE, probably in 1712, which was also known as Eldridges..

Richard Ferris died in 1729 leaving the estate to his daughter Emm Ferris, now married to Thomas Guest, who is described more fully under JEFF and JEFF'S COTTAGE. ⁱⁱ Thomas Guest was granted a new lease in 1737, to commence on his wife's death. This was on his life and that of John Packer son of John Packer of Minety, husbandman. In 1739, two years later, Thomas took out a licence to assign and John Packer's tenancy probably dates from this point up to 1763, although Thomas only died in 1781.

The Packer family of Minety first appear in Bagendon in 1701 when Henry Packer married Joane Parsloe. There are then three generations of John Packers. The eldest is named here with his son John, baptised in 1736, being the life. John senior married Alice Ferris in 1729, the youngest child of Richard and Ann Ferris, and the sister of Emm, Thomas Guest's wife and now the leaseholder.

Emm Guest died in 1762. John Packer senior, who was then in occupation ,was granted a new lease in 1763 which added to his son John Packer junior, now 24, the lives of Harry and Elizabeth Hiscock, aged 4 and 3, two of John's grandchildren. The fine was £45.

But in 1775 Packer obtained a licence to assign both Wrights and Jeff's Cottage to Giles Haines. The rent of Wrights in 1789-91 was paid by Edward Haines but apparently previously by Giles Haines. Edward was the leaseholder in the Inclosure Award by which time the property had been incorporated into Bagendon Farm. For the brothers Giles and Edward Haines baptised in Daglingworth in the 1740's See JEFF'S and JEFF'S COTTAGE.

12. BROWN'S PROPERTY

This was quite a substantial holding with a house and some 120 acres of land. It was held first by copy of Court Roll of 1656 by George Brown and then by his sons, John and Robert. The Browns lived in Fairford and Kempsford and while describing themselves as yeoman were often called Mr.

John in the same year 1656 also obtained an assignment of Whoreshay from Giles Dowle out of what became Parsloe's which led to confusion in the records only finally resolved in the Inclosure Award.

After John's death Robert became copyholder and in turn left the estate to his sons William and Robert. The younger Robert predeceased William but William left or gave the property to Robert's son Henry dying in 1749.

Henry obtained the copyhold in 1748, the year before William's death, unless there is a mistaken date in the Archer Survey. In 1760 Henry granted a lease of the property to John Parsloe for 14 years at an annual rent of £20 per annum. The lease states that Parsloe is already in occupation. In 1776 he was still renting the property but wanted to buy it. In his letter to the steward, Alexander Ready (partly quoted under Parsloe's above) he wrote:

I have seen Mr Brown and talked with him on his Interest in his Estate here, but he absolutely refuses to part from it but he don't seem inclinable to renew, if on fresh application he should still refuse it, as I rent it, & it is more convenient to me than any one besides, I shall be much obliged to you for the refusal of it, & you may be assured I will give the utmost return.

It seems Brown did continue to lease to John Parsloe as Henry Brown (Parsloe) is shown paying the rent from 1772-77. But in 1781, Lord Weymoouth granted a lease to Daniel Mathews, yeoman of Buscot in Berkshire. It appears this was only to take effect on the death of Henry Brown as he remained proprietor and John and then his youngest son, Thomas Parsloe, became the occupier in the 1780.

Henry Brown died in 1788 even though 'Henry Brown late William' is recorded as paying rent from 1789 to 1791. But in 1791 a new lease was granted to the Mathews and Daniel is shown as leaseholder in the Inclosure Award although the property has shrunk to 96 acres. Bonny Mead is described as 4 acres which may be a correction of the ½ acre in the 1684 Survey and the 1746 Survey.

Thomas Parsloe must have done a deal with the Mathews family as while they remain in the land tax records as proprietor, Thomas again became occupier. Joseph Pitt sold the freehold to William Mathews for £520 and Daniel Mathews who was presumably his brother redeemed the land tax in 1804 when Thomas Parsloe was still occupier.

13. JEFF'S.

The history of Jeff's was at times in the same ownership as that of Jeff's Cottage. Jeff's tenement was a fairly small holding built on the old orchard of John Marshall, gent. It was held from 1660 by William Jeffs and his wife, Elizabeth, on their lives and on that of their daughter, also Elizabeth. On 7/12/1680 William Jeffs also became tenant of Jeff's Cottage. The daughter Elizabeth died in 1689, then the wife of John Jordan also Hammond.

William Jeffs was buried at Bagendon on 9^{th} November 1695 and his wife Elizabeth took out letters of administration on 19^{th} February 1697. The inventory for William, also dated 19^{th} February 1697, valued his 2 small messuages (i.e Jeff's and Jeff's Cottage) at £7-15-0 and his furniture at £3-2-6. As the surviving life in the lease of Jeff's, Elizabeth was presumably living there. But she herself died in 1699 and was buried on 20^{th} September. Following her death, the inventory for her dated 16^{th} September 1701 listed only one small cottage or messuage at £3-10-0 and furniture at £3-0-6.

The descent of Jeff's after the death of Elizabeth Jeffs is unclear. There are two leases to Berkeley Eycott, the first dated 4th March 1699 with a Fine for Lives of £20. This may have been to take effect on Elizabeth's death which could explain why he had a further lease after her death dated 24th October 1700 with a Fine for a new life of £6-10-0. The date, 24th October 1700, is also the date of Eycott's leases of Beares Hay and Moor House.

Roger Hammonds died in 1712 and it seems that in some way Roger had acquired Jeff's from Berkeley Eycott who died in 1717. When the 1719 Court Baron reported Roger's death since the last Court, it named Henry Guest as the next taker of Jeff's and Henry Guest is shown paying its 2/- rent in 1727. Roger Hammond, as will be shown, acquired Jeff's Cottage, but how he came to acquire Jeff's as well is not known.

In the 1729 Court Baron there is a reference to Henry Guest exchanging with Thomas Harding (the Hills son-in-law) half an acre of land lying under the Downs in the North Field for half an acre of land shooting over the Moor way in the same field. Presumably this related to Jeff's.

In 1737 Henry Guest's presumed son Thomas Guest was granted a lease of Jeff's and (albeit at an increased Fine of £52-10-0 for 3 lives) of Jeff's Cottage as well as of Wright's in which Thomas's one year old nephew, John Packer, was made a life.

The Guest family was based in Kemble. If the reconstruction in the Guest Tree is correct, Henry was born in Kemble in 1681 to Robert and Elianor Guest. He married Hannah Broad in North Cerney in 1704 and had two sons, Thomas (the 1737 lessee), and Henry baptised there. But both his son Henry and his wife Hannah died. He then married Sarah Smith at Kemble and moved back there.

There is one other Henry Guest to account for. He married Elizabeth Williams in Kemble and their daughter, Wilmoth Guest, married the youngest John Packer. Henry may well have been a son of Henry and his new wife Sarah, replacing Henry's lost son by Hannah.

In addition to Thomas Guest's life, the lives for the 1737 lease of Jeff's were Henry Guest, son of William Guest, labourer of Kemble in Wiltshire, and his wife Mary, and Hester, daughter of Thomas Smith of Northleach, cordwainer, and his wife Elizabeth. Henry was baptised at Kemble on 31st January 1720/1, a son of William and Mary Guest, but his relationship to Thomas is not known.

In 1738, Thomas Guest was granted a licence to assign Jeff's to anyone on the terms of the 1737 lease.

Henry Guest, son of William and Mary was buried at Kemble on 18th November 1767. Hester as Esther Smith married Richard Harding at Northleach on 17th September 1757. Both were of the parish and Elizabeth Smith was one witness. Hester Harding wife of Richard was buried at Northleach on 15th June 1770. So by then Thomas Guest was the only life in being. He died in 1781 but probably assigned the tenancy to Giles Haines before then. It then descended through members of the Haines family and was amalgamated with Jeff's Cottage. See 14 Jeff's Cottage.

14. JEFF"S COTTAGE aka ELDRIDGES

The second property was Jeff's Cottage also known as Eldridges. This property was larger than Jeff's and had a higher rent, so the Jeffs may have prospered. The property was originally in the possession of Elias Hyde and Alice Eldridge. But William Jeffs acquired it on 7th December 1680 on the lives of his daughter Elizabeth, now Elizabeth Jordan also Hammond, her son Roger Jordan also Hammond, and Mary Holder daughter of Thomas Holder of Bagendon.

These names have caused difficulties as no relevant Jordan has been found. But Elizabeth Juffs (*sic*) married John Hammonds at Painswick on 9/9/1679 and Roger Hammons (*sic*) was baptised on 14/5/1680 at Bagendon, a son to John and Elizabeth. Elizabeth was buried there on 22/6/1689. Mary Holder's baptism has not been traced but there are records of other children of Thomas and Mary Holder at Bagendon. And Mary daughter of Thomas Holder was buried at Cirencester on 5th May1697 while Mary, wife of Thomas Holder day labourer, was buried at Bagendon later in 1697 on 26th November. By this time therefore the only remaining life for Jeff's Cottage was Roger Hammonds.

John Brown of Fairford, leaseholder of Brown's, acquired Jeff's Cottage by lease dated 20th February 1701ⁱ on his life and that of John Betterton of Quenington, yeoman, and William, son of William Cowley of Fairford, husbandman. John Brown died in 1712 and left the property to William Cowley junior, stating that he acquired it by purchase from Roger Hammonds, who was the surviving life of the 1680 lease.

It seems the property was then rented by Richard Ferris, who is named in the 1719 Court Baron for not repairing his house in 'Eldridges Close', and appears to pay the 5/- rent in 1727.

Richard Ferris was the nephew of Mary Ferris who married Thomas Poulton. He and his wife Ann had a daughter Emm who married Thomas Guest and a daughter Alice who married John Packer, the son of Henry Packer of Minety who married Joan Parsloe. Presumably Richard Ferris transferred the property to his son-in-law Thomas Guest

Thomas Guest leased Jeff's Cottage in 1737, as well as Jeff's and Wrights already described. The 1737 lease of Jeff's Cottage simply added Thomas as a life with the lease to commence on the death of William Betterton who lived until 1758. The 1746 Survey noted that William Cowley was dead so the lives in being were then John Betterton and Thomas Guest. Thomas Betterton died in 1758 and Thomas Guest was then the sole remaining life.

The position then both for Jeff's Cottage and for Wrights is confused not least because references have been lost.

On 12th November 1759, John Packer of Minety yeoman agreed with Ewan Thomas on behalf of Lord Weymouth on a lease for a third life 'on tent of Jeff's' which appears here to be Jeff's Cottage. An old note also says paying £10 to replace Betterton with a new life for his grandson John, son of his son John; There is also a note of a lease dated 21st October 1760 where the lives are Thomas Guest, John, son of John Packer, and Harry Hiscock. Another note dated 1760 which refers to John Packer of Minety yeom paying £28 for adding two lives probably refers to Wrights. But there is an undated note: 'John Packer of Minety yeom and John Packer son of John Packer a grandson of ye purchaser and Harry Hilcox son of Thomas and Betty Hilcox'. Finally on 19th November 1763 there are leases of Wrights and of Jeff's Cottage. For Jeff's the rent is 5/- and the Heriot 10/- and the lives are the three grandchildren, John Packer and Harry and his sister Sarah Hiscock. This lease cancelled the 1760 lease and pays a fine of £6 to replace Thomas Guest's life with Sarah Hiscock.

The entry for Jeff's in the Archer Survey has erased additions which appear to relate to Jeff's Cottage, not Jeff's. These are:

'sold to Packer of Minety. Mr Packer sold to Giles Haines'

'abt 5 Tenants Cottages and Gardens. one of wch divided into two, & Land belonging'

'Packer ?acquired the ?Licence /and sett 3 Lives upon the whole except a small part'

The cottages are probably the cottages referred to in the Inclosure Award as being on Merchants Down. They were not then estates but belonged to the Marquess of Bath who in the Inclosure Award had the right to use the adjoining private roads and a spring at Spring Head for the use of the cottages.

i The date in the 1746 Survey is 20th February 1700 but this must be 1700/01 as the list of leases to 1700 does not have it, but does have other leases dated October 1700.

In the Inclosure Award, Giles Haines is named as the leaseholder of Jeff's and Jeff's Cottage, which had been amalgamated, and his brother Edward Haines as the leaseholder of Wrights, (which was incorporated into Bagendon Farm).

Giles Haines was baptised in Daglingworth on 21/3/1740/1 and Edward on 13/3/1746/7, sons of John and Ann Haines. Edward had a son Edward baptised there on 27/8/1774. The family was coming up in the world and were large landowners in Bagendon in the 19th century. Giles left a long Will dated 1st October 1802, annexed to Letters of Administration, dated 19th October 1805. His Bagendon estates were inherited by his nephew Edward. In the Will he refers to himself as of Daglingworth Esquire and his brother as of Badgington, gentleman.

15. GLEBE LANDS

This consisted of the house and lands which were the property of the Rector or Parson for the time being.

A Terrier of 1705 gives the following detailed description:

Reesⁱ comments on the attempted exchange of 8 acres of glebe in 1714 and it appears there may have been an earlier attempted exchange in 1701. The land was known as Parson's Piece or Parson's Grove being a grant recorded in 1199 from Robert de Chandos (with the church and other lands) to the priory of Llanthony in Gloucester for the purpose of supplying timber to repair the Mill. No exchange was effected until the Inclosure Act.

In 1826 the then Rector, the Reverend John Lewis Bythesea, built a new house, now Bagendon House and, seeking permission to live in it, described the Rectory – a Glebe house of the yeoman type – according to Rees as 'small, mean and unhealthy so as to be unfit'. But when in old age he had a curate, he then claimed it was 'in good and sufficient repair'.

It will be recalled that the Schedule in the Inclosure Award recorded that the Marquess had in hand: Allotments in the South Field for Berts Ham and Commons after deducting thereout £2 5s 3¼ d per annum for the value of Timber & Hedges in the Glebe and School Lands received by his Lordship in exchange.

From this it appears that some deal had been done giving the timber on the Glebe lands (and School Lands) to the Marquess.

16. MOOR WOOD

The 2nd May 1729 Court Baron contains an entry:

Wee Present [Mr inserted] Thomas Eycote deceased [and Richard Eycote inserted] since the Last Court But What Service Acrews to the Lord Wee Know not But the next taker My Lord.

In the margin is written: Guests Estate

This is a puzzle as the Bagendon Thomas Eycotes of the Bear Inn died in 1730 and 1732. Of neighbouring Eycote families there was Thomas, son of Thomas Eycott of Woodmacot, buried at North Cerney on 28th September 1728 but the only Richard in the period is Richard son of Richard Eycote buried in Cirencester on 28th January 1723/4. Both of these fit as the last Court was 10 years earlier and Moor Wood (as opposed to Moor House) was in Lord Weymouth's hands at the time of the Inclosure Award.

Henry Guest may have been a tenant of Jeff's at the time and his presumed son Thomas was tenant of Jeff's, Jeff's Cottage and Wrights (which was also known as Guests) in 1737. But the reference to Guests Estate in the marginal note is unexplained.

It is likely that Thomas and Richard Eycote were tenants of Moor Wood and that from this date Lord Weymouth took it 'in hand' wanting the timber, and retained it until he sold the Manor to Pitt. Pitt appears to have sold it to John Haines along with Moor House in 1809 and in 1818 Haines amalgamated the 16/3 Land Tax with that for of Moor House.

17. COTTAGES

As described in no. 1, BAGENDON FARM, in 1685 William Chandler was granted the lease of a cottage. William Chaundler of Lower Dunsbourne and Emma Foster of Bagendon were married at Bagendon on13th November 1684. On September 13th 1685 Sir John Thynne leased a cottage to William Chandler on his life and that of his wife Emma and son Thomas Chandler. Leases to 1700 record that the cottage had a garden and was 67 feet in length and 18 feet in breadth. The Value and Fine were both £4, the rent 4/- and the heriot 3/4.

On 27th August 1745, Lord Weymouth granted John Eycott of Cirencester, goldsmith, a lease of no. 1, BAGENDON FARM, being a farmhouse and lands etc. among which was 'a cottage with the appurtenances near the Farm house called 'Chandlers Cottage'. In the 1792 Inclosure award, the Schedule of Edward Haines holdings in Bagendon Farm includes 'Cottage & Garden called Chandler's Cottage of 8 perches'.

There is also Mathew Marchant's (or Merchant's) Cottage built on the Lord's Waste and regularised by payment of a small rent. Mathew Marchant died in 1770 and the cottage was then occupied by John and then William Harding. Both Harding and Marchant are familiar names in Bagendon records. Marchants was the old name for Hill's tenement and the family rented the estate before the Hills. They may then have fallen on evil days. There is also a Merchants Down. and in 1763 a 'ground heretofore in the possession of Michael Marchent (Jeff's tenement).

In the Archer Survey is an erased note in the entry added to the parcels for no. 13, JEFF'S stating "about 5 Tenants Cottages and Gardens, one of which divided into two, and land belonging". It appears that this note in fact related to No. 14, Jeff's Cottage. The cottages will have been on Merchants Down.

The Inclosure Award gave the Marquess the right to use the adjoining roads and spring for the use of the cottages.

8 WATER RENTS

Water rents are only mentioned in the Archer Survey which indicates they were payable by the inhabitants of Woodmancote. Presumably they would have been in that part of Woodmancote that was in the parish of North Cerney. If the springs and stream were on the Bagendon side, one can understand why they needed the water. The spring may have been the same one as the Inclosure Award reserved to the Lord for the use of the Cottages.

19. SCHOOL LANDS

This property was so called because, in 1722, Rebecca Powell left money and property (including this one in Bagendon) in her Will for the founding of a school in Circnester which became the Yellow School. Rebecca Powell as Rebecca Godsalve married William George of Circnester in 1789 at St. Clement Danes in London. William died in 1703 and in 1708 Rebecca married a London merchant, Thomas Powell, whom she outlived.

The George family had been Lords of the Manor of Baunton since the time of Henry the Eighth. How they came to acquire the freehold of the neighbouring Bagendon property is not known but the then Lord, Richard George, was seized of it in the early 17th century when the tenant was John Davis. In the middle of the century, the tenant was Christopher Parsloe from whom it descended to his son William. William did not die until 1720 but, in 1702, his son-in-law Henry Packer, who was married to William's daughter Joane, was granted the reversion of the lease on his and his wife's lives.

There may well have been some tension between the residents of Bagendon and neighbouring Baunton as evidenced by the following report in the 1701 Bagendon Court Baron (LA: NMR 1983):

They present upon their View that the Watercourse running from North Cerney to Cirencester in or by the Long Ham in the parish of Bagendon aforesaid hath beene heretofore turned out of the Antient Channell and usual watercourse & by reason thereof a little parcell of meadow ground belonging to the Parsonage aforesaid and the Widow Ravenhill of Bagendon And alsoe about a Quarter of an Acre of meadow ground belonging to the Manno^r and ffarme of Bagendon aforesaid And alsoe another parcell of meadow ground lying in the forme of A Horseshooe being about halfe a Quarter of an Acre and belonging to Badgendon ffarme aforesaid are got on Bawton side Altho the Same belong to and ought to bee on Bagendon Side And are in the parish of Bagendon And they find by informacion that the said Watercourse was turned out of its course above fifty years since by John George Esquire deceased then Lord of the Manor of Bawnton aforesaid And they also present that they cannot find two parcells of meadow more in the nature of Horshooes claymed by Job Dowle Junior Occupier of the ffarme of Badgendon aforesaid to bee lying in the Said Meadow called long Ham neither can they receive any informacion touching the Same.

Henry Packer died in 1728 and Joane in 1741. Their son John, who was tenant of Wright's and Jeff's Cottage at times, did not inherit the property. Instead it was let to a spinster, Sarah Wood, on her life and that of her brother and of Ann Huntingdon who married John Bishop in 1758. By the 1770's, apparently after Sarah Wood's death, the property was held on trust for Ann Bishop separately from her husband John. In 1783 it was mortgaged to a Catherine Wood and then in 1789 sold to Edward Haines who kept it at least until 1823.


THE EYCOTT FAMILY 2 Family of John and Elizabeth All at Cirencester unless otherwise stated
